We now operate three Eye Hospitals in India and are planning a total of 60,000 or more FREE Eye Surgeries at these facilities this year alone. Vision clear, his agony ends

COIMBATORE, APRIL 9. After 32 excruciating months, Selvaraj is now able to see his wife and work his way around the hospital ward.

From a lorry driver who was earning well to support his family, he turned into a recluse, who struggled to even potter about his modest home in Navalenipatti near Namakkal. All due to a condition called ocular phemphigoid, an inflammatory disease, which results in the drying of the corneal surface and eventual opacification of the cornea and blindness.

Under a novel procedure carried out last week, in which the K K-pro corneal prosthesis, developed inhouse at the Sankara Eye Centre (SEC) was implanted into his left eye, he now has a vision of 6/60. Selvaraj is still unable to open his eye fully, but J.K. Reddy, Assistant Director at the SEC, who developed the prosthesis and performed the procedure, says his eyelids will soon be lifted up to allow him better vision.

"Normally, such prostheses are about 2.5 mm in width. But, we designed one 4 mm in width because we were not just looking at his rehabilitation; we wanted him to live life independently. He can see a field of about 40 to 50 degrees," adds Dr. Reddy. Of the five prostheses developed, doctors zeroed in on the one that would suit his condition.

The K K-pro, abbreviation for Kovai Keratoprosthesis, was developed after five years of research and manufactured by a Chennai firm.

Selvaraj was chosen for this procedure under the "Gift of Vision" programme after stem cell and corneal transplants at a Bangalore Hospital failed. "In his case, transplantation of a live cornea would have failed because a cornea needs lubrication to survive. This cornea is made of polymethyl methacrylate, a bio-compatible plastic. Also, there is no risk of rejection," states R. V. Ramani, Managing Trustee.

As for Selvaraj's other eye, Dr. Reddy said that with such procedures it is not ethical to operate both eyes simultaneously. "He wanted his left eye, which was worst affected, to be operated first." The surgery, which would cost more than Rs. 1 lakh, was performed free of cost at the SEC.

Says Sudha, Selvaraj's wife, "I'm thrilled that he can now see. He was only feeling our two children till now. That will change once we go back home."

A new era in the community eye care for the people of Andhra Pradesh began on March 2nd, 2004, with the formal inauguration of the Sankara Eye Hospital, Guntur by Sankaracharyas of Sri Kanchi Kamakoti Peetam. The hospital stands majestically on the Guntur-Vijayawada highway at Pedakakani village and is ready to serve the community. The hospital is well designed to house 400 beds. At present, it has 100 beds for free patients and 20 beds for paid patients.

The President of India Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam had kindly agreed to inaugurate the Hospital on March 2, 2004, but unfortunately he cancelled all his public appearances including ours, due to the announcement of election dates. The Board of Directors of SEF, several volunteers and their families, supporters of SEF (TANA & BATA members and donors) traveled all the way to Guntur, from the United States for the inauguration. The hospital started functioning (Outpatient) on March 3rd and Eye Surgeries will be performed from the last week of May. Eye Camps will also commence in the month of May.

It is true that we just reached the first milestone in our journey towards eradicating curable blindness in India by the year 2020.
